

What is an External Youth Advocate?

An external youth advocate is an independent advocate – not employed by the state – who provides assistance and support to youth placed in the state run juvenile justice facilities and their families.

The Youth Advocate Can:

- Ensure the youth's fundamental rights are protected while in the facility
- Assist youth and their families with questions, concerns, complaints regarding the facilities and services
- Assist youth in resolving issues
- Assist youth in filing grievances
- Work with youth and their families to ensure an individualized educational plan
- Work with youth, family members and others to facilitate return to their home communities

Your Rights

The facility must give you and your family a detailed list of your rights when you come into the facility. The external advocate can help you understand your rights which include **your civil rights, your right to be treated with dignity and respect** and rights related to:

- Filing a grievance or complaint without fear of retaliation
- Protection from abuse, physical punishment and harassment
- Communication by telephone and mail
- Family visitation
- Private communication with clergy, attorney and advocate
- The practice of religion or faith of your choice
- Rehabilitation and treatment
- Education

The services provided by External Advocates are free of discrimination and supportive of all cultures, races, ethnic groups, religious affiliations, sexual orientations, and persons with disabilities.
